In the name of God amen I Robert McCulley of the State of North Carolina & County of Orange being in tolerable health and sound mind & memory, thanks to God for the Same calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do hereby make and ordain this to be my last Will and testament and first of all I give and recommend my Soul into the hands of God that gave it and my body tot he Earth to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner at the discretion of my Executors Moore McCulley and Saley McCulley and as touching Such worldly Estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me with in this life - I give bequeath & dispose of the Same in manner & form following I give & bequeath to my Son Moore McCulley the half of my land, whereon I now live I give and bequeath the other half of my tract to my daughter Saley McCulley with the new end of the house the land which I now live on lying in Orange County on the little Alimance, the land contains 570 acres. I do leave my house hold Stuff to allow & Sally McCulley equally divided I do leave to my daughter Sally McCulley a negro boy named Henery - as for the Mackade Land I order that it should stand as it is only them that has not got their share it shall be made up to them either in money or property - I order that William McCulley should not get so much as the rest of fifty Dollars because he got more than his Share of the Mackade land & because he borrowed money from me which he did not pay me. I leave the rest of my property to be equally divided among my Seven Children and last I do appoint my Son Moore McCulley & Sally McCulley to be my Executors of this my last Will & testament - In Witness hereof I have hereunto Set my hand & Seal this 25<sup>th</sup> of November 1814

 to my daughter sold at 2000. I have a goodly tract of land - in the  
 the Abimonee land I do not think it should stand as it is  
 only then that I can not get them to see it shall be made up  
 of them either in money or present - I do not think William  
 should not get so much as the rest of the bills so that I cannot  
 get more than his share of the Abimonee land & because he  
 borrowed money from me which he did not pay me. I  
 have the debt of my present to be equally divided among  
 my own children. I do not think I should pay more than  
 Mr. Walter's share. Mr. Walter to be my executor of this my  
 last will & testament - He being dead I have thought  
 let my land be sold the 25th of November 1810
