On this 27th day of August 1833, personally appeared
in open Court, (It being a Court of Record) before
the Justices of the Court of the County of Wayne
and State of Kentucky, now sitting, William
et al, a resident of the United States of America,
in the County of Wayne & State of Kentucky, aged
eighty years, who being first duly sworn according
to Law, doth on his oath, make the following
Declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of
the act of Congress ^{passed} June the 11th 1832 -
That he entered the service of the United States
under the following name ^{officers} and served
as herein stated -

He was born in the County of Frederick, and
State of Maryland in the year 1752 - when
he was 12 or 13 years old ^{when} his father died;
his mother with ^{him} the family then moved
to the County of Guilford in the State of
North Carolina, where he resides, when the war
of the Revolution commenced he entered the
service of the United States in the ^{apenas} County
of Guilford North Carolina at about the
age of twenty five in the year 1777 or 78, as
a Volunteer on foot, under Col Martin -
The Captain of the Company was Thomas Goddard
- (as he now thinks) They marched from
Guilford to Moore County on the waters of
Cape Fear River, to oppose the Scotch-Irish

2 who had arisen to save ⁽²⁾ his ~~the~~ ~~state~~ - ~~the~~ ~~state~~ they had no very important engagements but was engaged in a skirmish on Little ~~Rock~~ ~~in~~ the ~~opps~~ County of Illinois, a stream which runs into Cape Fear - His service in the ~~opps~~ and character of volunteer was for three months - when he was discharged - but did not obtain a written discharge

about one year afterwards, he was drafted into the Militia of the State of North Carolina in the said County of Guilford & served under General Rutherford - the said Col Martin being the Col of the Regiment to which he belonged - Henry Whittell the Captain - He marched with the Army against up across the ~~edick~~ River, from thence to the ~~Hotter~~ River, which was ~~crossed~~ ~~thence~~ across the blue ridge - ~~then~~ they then crossed the Pigeon & French broad Rivers & went on to the Seneca River to the Indian Towns against whom ~~the~~ they marched out to prevent further depredations upon the whites - when they reached the ~~3~~ Indian Towns, they were mostly deserted - they destroyed ~~the~~ the Towns, the crops, the ~~locks~~ &c. and returned home - he having served three months - he obtained as well as he now recollects no written discharge -

about two years afterwards, he was again drafted into the service in the Militia of North Carolina, in the County of Guilford under the aforesaid Col Martin - the name of the Captain of the Company he does not now recollect - for the term of six months - but did not perform

 called the small pox, about the time the army
 was going to march into the States, that when the
 Army or Regiment arrived under Col. Chartier
 returned from the East mentioned service, he
 was told by the officers, that if he would volunteer
 in the how Company, and use his own horse,
 and serve as a volunteer for the space of three
 months against the Tories & enemies of the Country
 that it should be considered in the same light
 and be deemed as equivalent to the service of the
 six months last mentioned, which he was prevented
 from performing by reason of his
 sickness & weakness - In accordance with the
 aforesaid statements of the officers, he took his
 own horse, & volunteered & served in the how
 Company three months, under Col. Chartier,
 and Captain Doogan - They marched down

 order or discharge - He did, he has stated - He states, that
 he has no documentary evidence - ^{and knows}

 that his parents kept none of their age, he has not
 been named in North Carolina in the County of
 Guilford ^{about} 28 years ago, when he moved
