It is an unusual incident, if not the first time in the history of track athletics at Indiana university, that brothers have won "I's" in the same event. Harry Acre has been the high jumper at Indiana since 1912, and this year his brother, Ragle Acre, sprang into prominence by winning his "I" against Northwestern at Chicago, besides winning the second all-round championship as an athlete. Both boys are studying medicine, and may enter an eastern university next year. They are the sons of Robert H. Acre, state representative from Marion county.

DOCTOR'S \$400 BILL APPROVED BY JUDGE

Rules Charge Reasonable De- spite Protest of Patients

Superior Judge Buente has upheld Dr. Robert C. Acre in a \$400 medical fee suit against John R. Mitchell, real estate representative.

Mr. Mitchell contested the suit on the ground the bill for an operation was excessive.

Dr. Acre testified he had performed an operation, which required two stages at intervals of two weeks apart and that he had eliminated a \$25 charge for accompanying Mr. Mitchell to St. Louis, Mo., for a consultation.

He testified he had knocked \$100 off the bill because of the times.

Judge Bunete gave Dr. Acre \$400 judgment.

Probate Judge Veneman is writing an opinion in another medical fee case in which Dr. O. C. Stephens claimed a fee of \$5000 against the estate of the late Elizabeth Fares Lauenstein for medical services and which was contested by heirs on the grounds it was exorbitant.

MEDICS TEE OFF HERE TOMORROW

1929. Sept.
More Than 100 to Take Part
in Tourney on Muni Links;
Prizes Offered

More than 100 golfing medics, a majority of them from out-of-town, are expected to tee off tomorrow at the Municipal course as the annual physician's golf tourney, held in conjunction with the Indiana Medical Association's annual convention, gets under way.

Play will be divided into two sections, part of the golfers starting between 8 and 10 o'clock in the morning, and the others starting about 1 o'clock in the afternoon. Participants may have their choice of morning or afternoon play. The tournament will include a medal handicap affair, arranged by Dr. Robert H. Acre, of Evansville, golf chairman of the Vanderburgh County Medical Association, which is to be host to the 1,000 or more visiting physicians and their families to be here tomorrow, Thursday and Friday for the convention.

OFFER SEVEN PRIZES

A total of seven prizes are to be given in the tourney, Dr. Acre said. These will include first, second and third low net scores and first, second and third low gross scores. The prizes will be awarded Thursday night at the annual medical association banquet to be held at Hotel McCurdy.

A golf luncheon, free to physicians taking part in the tournament, is to be served in the clubhouse at the Municipal course from 12 to 1 o'clock tomorrow noon, according to Dr. Acre.

TO TAKE PICTURES

One of the features of the day will be the taking of moving pictures of the tournament. L. Earl DeWitt, local cameraman, has been secured by the local committee to take a large number of action shots of the participants during the morning round. These films will be rushed via air mail to Chicago for rapid development and speeded back here in time for cutting and editing before the banquet Thursday night, when they will be shown to the entire convention.

That a large number of out-of-

town golfers will take part in the tourney is assured by the number of letters from physicians already received asking particulars and signifying their intentions of shooting. At least a dozen cities and towns over the state have already made it known they will be represented, while the majority are not expected to send word but will show up at the tee at starting time, Dr. Acre said last night.

Dr. Bill Ritchie carded a 79 Thursday for medal honors in the Bob Acre Memorial Golf Tourney at Evansville Country Club. Limited to doctors, Dr. W. M. Adye won net laurels with 85(12) — 73. . . .

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
